Benjamin Schreyer awarded an SPIE Optics and Photonics Scholarship

BELLINGHAM, Washington, USA — **Benjamin Schreyer** has been awarded a 2024 Optics and Photonics Scholarship by SPIE, the international society for optics and photonics, for potential contributions to optics, photonics, or a related field.



Schreyer is an undergraduate student in physics at the University of Maryland (College Park), working with **Dmitri Kaganovich** at the Naval Research Laboratory. His current research with Kaganovich aims to experimentally test predictions of statistical nonlinear optics. Schreyer also enjoys designing and lecturing an introductory computational optics course under **Professor Thomas Antonsen** and studying constrained weakly ordered permutations with **Professor William Gasarch**. “I look forward to advancing astronomical instrumentation and computational methods in my career and am excited to see such great support for my ambitions,” said Schreyer.

This month, the Society is awarding \$303,000 in scholarships to 72 outstanding SPIE Student Members, based on their potential contribution to optics and photonics, or a related discipline. Successful applicants were evaluated, selected, and approved by the SPIE Scholarship Committee, chaired by **SPIE Senior Member Brian Primeau**.

Since this program began in 1978, SPIE has distributed more than \$7.5 million dollars in individual scholarships. This ambitious effort reflects the Society's commitment to education as well as to the future generations of optical scientists and engineers around the world.
